Making our rivers healthy again

Restoration means busting down deadbeat dams, collecting solid environmental data, picking up trash & debris, planting trees, replacing undersized culverts, and of course finding the money to do all this good work.

One Less Dam Blocking Your Rivers

As of July, 2014 the Wells River flows freely through this area for the first time in over 100 years! Like all dams, the Franconia Paper Mill dam was blocking the Wells River flow and ability to move sediment and debris downstream. This deadbeat dam was also a flood and recreation hazard and a barrier to fish, including brook trout. Now fish can swim upstream to spawn and people can enjoy this stretch of river safely.

Taking it to the Bank

More than 2,600 trees and shrubs were planted this year — that's a four-year total of more than 11,000! These plants reduce erosion, improve water quality, reduce water temperatures by providing shade, increase habitat for fish and wildlife, increase summer food for songbirds and other wildlife, and stabilize the stream banks. Many thanks to the volunteers who helped plant trees and remove invasive species. Riverbanks were restored in:

- Bradford, VT on the Waits River
- Cavendish, VT on the Black River
- Groton, VT on the Wells River
- Hawley, MA on the Chickley River
- Orford, NH on the Connecticut River
- Piermont, NH on the Eastman Brook
- Woodstock, VT on the Ottauquechee River

Bringing Money to the Table to Protect Working Farms and Forests

In January, 2015, CRWC and six partners were awarded a \$10 million dollar grant from the USDA Regional Conservation Partnership Program to fund pollution reduction projects on farm and forestland throughout the Long Island Sound watershed. Our work will focus on the Connecticut River basin, which contributes 70% of the freshwater to the Sound and is important to the Sound's health. The grant will be matched dollar for dollar, bringing \$20 million dollars for climate adaptation and clean water projects to landowners over the next five years. CRWC will work with dozens of landowners to ensure their valuable investment in their soil and land doesn't continue washing downstream.

Bringing Environmental Data to the Table

To ensure CRWC spends restoration dollars wisely, current and comprehensive environmental information is needed. Because the current state of the upper watershed's nutrient loading has not been measured for over 10 years, we initiated a unique and large-scale monitoring effort. On August 6, 2014, with help from Vermont and New Hampshire state government, CRWC organized volunteers and state employees from New Hampshire, Vermont, and Massachusetts, as well as Yale University in the first Samplepalooza. In a single day, water samples were collected from 55 locations spanning over 1,000 river miles in three states. All 66 samples were analyzed for total nitrogen, total phosphorus, chloride, and total organic carbon. Analysis of the data shows that areas with the most forest land had the lowest total nitrogen values and there are locations with higher than expected nutrient concentrations. This monitoring initiative will continue and will be integral to everyone's work to make our rivers and the Long Island Sound healthy again.



A Thousand Stories for Cleaner Rivers & Greener Hydropower — The Power of Water / The Power of Words

The 5½-year process of federal relicensing of five major hydroelectric facilities on the mainstem of the CT River is about half over. These facilities produce over 30% of hydropower generation in New England and include four large dams at Wilder, Bellows Falls, and Vernon, VT and at Turners Falls, MA and the pump storage facility at Northfield Mountain in MA. The summer of 2015 is the second season of studies geared towards better understanding the impacts of the dams on resources in the 175 miles of affected river. CRWC has been commenting on the study designs and reports for the 71 studies on flows, fish passage and habitat, water quality, erosion, and recreation — over 300 pages of comments submitted so far!

But it's not enough — we need you! CRWC is working with River of Words Along the Connecticut River and Art for Water to gather your river stories in a project known as *The Power of Water/The Power of Words*. These stories will be submitted as public comment to the state and federal government as they make decisions about these five hydroelectric facilities. Your stories will then also become a monumental and inspiring community-created art installation to educate others about our rivers. Over 250 stories were collected from presentations throughout the year at schools, retirement communities and libraries.

Vermont Yankee — Persistence Pays Off

It took over eleven years, but together we made a difference. A notable win for the river is that VT Agency of Natural Resources (ANR) now evaluates, permits, and enforces thermal pollution discharges very differently. On October 13, 2014, ANR finally issued a new more protective permit for the hot water discharge coming from Entergy Vermont Yankee. The permit upholds our argument that bad science misguided previous permits. There is now precedent for future thermal discharge permits to reflect the reality of the river based on the biological needs of fish as they grow, breed, and migrate. That is important for the river now and into the future.

As of December 31, 2014, the Vermont Yankee nuclear plant shut down. Now the focus is on the decommissioning of the plant. CRWC Upper Valley River Steward David Deen has been appointed as a citizen representative to the newly formed Decommissioning Panel. CRWC feels it is important that the site return to reusable status as soon as possible. That means removing the plant in a safe and timely manner. Having an old, decrepit nuclear power plant on the shores of the Connecticut River is not good for the river and those who use it.



Fighting River Polluters

In June, 2015, CRWC and Earthrise Law Center of the Lewis & Clark School filed a Notice of Intent to file suit for violations of the Clean Water Act by the Whately, MA-based Chang Farms. Their process water for growing bean sprouts is treated and discharged to the Connecticut River. Over the last five years, Chang Farms has violated the terms of their federal pollution discharge permit in 55 of the last 60 months, 92% of the time, by discharging more pollutants than allowed by law. They have violated permit limits more than 330 times for four separate pollutants. They have also failed the toxicity test of their discharge 30% of the time.

Federal and state agencies have not stepped in to correct the violations, so CRWC is using a provision of the Clean Water Act that allows citizen groups to act. CRWC is now evaluating a response from Chang Farms and will work to negotiate an agreement to ensure they comply with their permits.

I grew up in Wilson, CT and have seen, in my lifetime, the positive changes in conditions of the CT River. Fishing/swimming/boating safely without the level of pollution and concern for our well-being is most satisfying. Thank you for all of your efforts!!!

Collaborating to Learn if Our Rivers Are Clean

CRWC continues to rally partners and funds to test bacteria levels in our rivers. The Connecticut River "Is it Clean?" water sampling program tests river access and recreation sites in Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and northern Connecticut. Samples are tested for E. coli bacteria as an indicator for all types

of other pathogens that could potentially make you sick. Samples are typically collected at each site weekly or bi-weekly and test results are posted

online 24 hours later, June through early October.





Is it Clean? Heavy rain is often the cause of high bacteria levels due to combined sewer overflows (CSOs) and stormwater runoff from urban, suburban, and agricultural areas. Cities and towns along the river continue to make significant investments in their sewers to reduce pollution and this has made a tremendous difference in our enjoyment of our rivers. Connecticut River Paddlers' Trail Expansion **Making Progress**

The Paddlers' Trail is a series of primitive campsites and access points for CT River paddlers. Two new campsites in Montague and Whatley, MA were funded in 2015 and will be constructed in 2016 by the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC), a project partner. In Connecticut, CRWC and AMC continue to have very positive discussions about developing several campsites, including on property owned by the CT Department of Energy & Environmental Protection. CRWC is working hard on stewardship and maintenance programs for new camp sites and access points in MA and CT, to be supported by fantastic CRWC volunteers.









